2. CALL FOR APPLICATIONS – MURRAY B. GARDNER JUNIOR FACULTY RESEARCH FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

The Center for Comparative Medicine announces the call for applications for the Murray B. Gardner Junior Faculty Research Fellowship for the 2019-20 academic year. The Murray B. Gardner Junior Faculty Research Fellowship, which originated in 2016, supports junior faculty performing research in Animal Modeling of Human Diseases with a focus on infectious disease or pathogen host interactions. The goal of this program is to enable career advancement of junior faculty to the Associate Professor level by facilitating an increased number of fundable grant submissions through a mentoring program in animal models of human disease with a focus on infectious disease or pathogen-host interactions. The biggest priority and challenge for Junior Faculty is securing their first extramurally funded award. A core mission of the Center for Comparative Medicine, within the Schools of Medicine and Veterinary Medicine, is to provide junior faculty with mentoring support to develop and secure extramural funding to carry out an extended research project. Congratulations to Dr. Ruth Shim, who recently graduated with the 2019 class of the Hedwig van Ameringen Executive Leadership in Academic Medicine® (ELAM) program.

Ruth Shim, MD, MPH is holder of the Luke & Grace Kim Professorship in Cultural Psychiatry in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the University of California, Davis School of Medicine. She is an Associate Professor of Clinical Psychiatry, Director of Cultural Psychiatry, and Chair of the Vice Chancellor's Advisory Committee on Faculty Excellence in Diversity at UC Davis

Health.

Dr. Shim received an MPH in health policy from Rollins School of Public Health at Emory University and an MD from Emory University School of Medicine. She is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the American Association of Community Psychiatrists. She serves on the Editorial Boards of *Psychiatric Services*, *Community Mental Health Journal*, and American Psychiatric Publishing, and is co-editor of the book, *The Social Determinants of Mental Health*. She is a 2018-2019 Fellow of the Executive Leadership in Academic Medicine (ELAM) Program, and an at-large member of the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine Forum on Mental Health and Substance Use Disorders.

Dr. Shim's research focuses on mental health disparities and inequities, and she provides clinical psychiatric care in the UC Davis Early Diagnosis and Preventative Treatment (EDAPT) Clinic.

- (1) The reasons you are a good fit for the seminar (5 points)
- (2) Your career goals and leadership aspirations (5 points), and
- (3) How attending the seminar will help you achieve those goals and advance your career (5 points)

Candidates who have submitted pre applications for this AAMC program in the past are encouraged to reapply and should address how the application has been strengthened.

If selected for support (registration and travel), applications will be due electronically to AAMC in late Summer of 2019.

Committees	Description	Typical Meeting Schedule
Admissions <u>Ranking</u> Subcommittee	Reviews all data available from the admissions process and submit ranked list of applicants to the Steering Subcommittee.	Meets at noon on Tuesdays (attend 8 meeting sessions throughout)
Admissions <u>Screening</u>	Screening can be done at home with internet access. Screeners review 100 - 200 medical school applications per year to identify applicants to be invited for interview. Applications are assigned in batches of 25. There is a mandatory orientation meeting. No other meetings are required.	Meets once for orientation/training
Admissions <u>Steering</u> Subcommittee	Provides oversight and integration of all phases of the Committee processes, and develop policies necessary to govern the process, including School of Medicine admissions criteria.	Meets at noon on alternate Wednesdays and Thursdays (attend 10 meeting sessions throughout the year)
Admissions <u>Selection</u> Subcommittee	Reviews the recommendations of Steering Subcommittee and make final decisions regarding offers of admission to the School of Medicine. Members on the Selection Subcommittee also serve as Steering Subcommittee members	Meets at noon on alternate Wednesdays and Thursdays (attend 10 meeting sessions throughout the year)
